Her ideas went on to conquer the world. Today, this method is more present than ever.


All around us things are changing, prompting us to try and rediscover our values and to recover our poise. It's important to view humankind as consisting of competent and creative individuals.


Questioning our existing thought patterns and accepting our children as independent beings are processes that can only take place once we have begun to look more closely at these issues.




Human beings must grow at their own pace... ... we're only there to support them.
